Typical Course Selection Model for Semester 1 (14 credits)

Semester 1: Nihongo Jisshu a, c, d, g, i (5 credits); Nihongo Enshu a & b (2 credits); Nihon Jijo A (2 credits), Foreign Studies A (2 credits) + a mixture of other courses of your choice. Note that foreign language, computer and sports practicum classes are worth 1 credit, while humanities, economics, commerce and public management "lecture" courses are worth 2 credits. The number of credits and type of credits required will depend on the requirements of your institution and degree, so be sure to confirm these points with your supervisor or study abroad coordinator before commencing your study abroad program.
